Editor's Note: All it is our rare honor to welcome yet another Silver Buffalo winner as our IFSR President for 2016 – 2017. Mark joins our outgoing president, PDG Harold Friend, MD at the lofty heights as a Silver Buffalo winner. In 89 years only 750 (out of many millions of volunteers) have been so honored. These are two incredible men who powerfully confirm lives of "Service Above Self." Harold will continue to serve on the Executive Board and Mark's biography is below. Let's join these men to move ahead the mission of IFSR.

Mark Kriebel first joined Rotary in 1977 in Ebensburg, PA, and is currently a member of the Endwell, NY Rotary Club, where he is Treasurer, and served as President in 2001-2002. Mark's District 7170 work has included chairing most District operating Committees, Assistant Governor, and 2006-07 District Governor. Since his year as Governor, Mark has served Rotary as Zone and Regional Membership Coordinator, Regional Public Image Coordinator, GETS, DGN, and DG trainer and Zone Institute training coordinator, and he has had multiple assignments as President's Representative, International Convention speaker, and Training Leader and Plenary speaker at the International Assembly in San Diego.



Mark also served on the 2013 and 2016 Council on Legislation, and he's a popular speaker at multi-District PETS across the Rotary World.

Mark joined Cub Scouts in Akron, Ohio's Pack 3094 in 1960, and after moving to New York State, received his Eagle as a Scout in Troop 225 in Vestal, NY. During his youth, he was senior crew leader for his Council's Philmont contingent, Council representative to "Report to the Nation", and a Brotherhood member of the Order of the Arrow.

Mark became extremely active in the Boy Scouts of America as an adult, where he has served as President of the Baden-Powell Council, President of Northeast Region Area 3, and Regional Vice-President. Mark currently sits on the National Council's Executive Board of the Northeast Region. In addition to chairing the national BSA committee dealing with membership growth and retention, he has led the Northeast Region contingent to both the 2002 Thailand and 2015 Japan World Scout Jamborees, and served as Chief of five National Jamborees. He will again serve as Chief of Echo Base Camp (staff housing) for the 2017 National Jamboree and will be the Base Camp operations liaison for the 2019 World Jamboree. Mark has been named a Distinguished Eagle Scout, is a Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow, and is a recipient of the Silver Beaver, Silver Antelope, and Silver Buffalo awards.

Outside of his Rotary and Scouting service, Mark has served as President of Endwell Baseball, founding Board member of Maine-Endwell Dollars for Scholars, and is currently Treasurer of the Center for Technology and Innovation. He is a familiar voice on radio, television, in stores and "on-hold", and, for nearly 40 years, has been the principal in the MUZAK franchise serving a 10 county area of New York.

Mark's wife Patricia has served as Endwell Rotary Club President, and served as District 7170 Governor in 2014-15. She has been a Scout leader and merit badge counselor. Mark and Patricia have hosted Rotary Youth Exchange Students, and they are Rotary Foundation Major Donors, Benefactors, and Bequest Society Members. They are parents of an Eagle Scout son and Girl Scout Silver award daughter, and two grandchildren.

National President Dr. Robert M. Gates Delivers Remarks at BSA's 2016 National Annual Meeting

Editor's Note: Dr. Gates speech is worth looking up to read it all. I have only included two of the paragraphs of his great speech. I encourage each of you to look it up, read it, and be inspired to do more for Scouting.

During the 2016 Boy Scouts of America National Annual Meeting, National President Dr. Robert M. Gates urged the organization to continue to strengthen Scouting for crucial reasons...

America needs Scouting to build character and leadership skills in boys and young men. Rarely has the lack of character and lack of courageous, bold, visionary leadership been so apparent in America. But not in Scouting. We are the country's largest and best leadership and character-building factory. When someone cynically refers to a person of character with the phrase, "He's a Boy Scout," it is, in fact, the highest compliment. It is who we are.

Finally, America needs Scouting because it needs young men for whom God is central in their lives. For Scouts of all ages, duty to God is not a merit badge or a piece of metal and colored cloth. It is the foundation stone of who and what we are. Without duty to God, there is no Scout oath, no Scout movement. A boy who kneels before his God will stand tall as a man.

We are on the threshold of a significant historical event – a return to positive national growth for the first time in decades.

Zdeněk Michálek European Region Chair



"Because I have known the torment of thirst I would dig a well where others may drink." (E. T. Seton). Alongside intelligence and ability, an important personal quality can promote the attainment of goals - a positive attitude. This is illustrated by Zdeněk Michálek (born 23thJune 1953 in Nový Jičín), whose whole path in life has been fueled on the basis of not being indifferent towards his surroundings, but moving things forward. After graduating from the Technical High School in Kopřivnice(1972) he was employed in the local factory Tatraas an innovation suggestions agent, and later followed in career studies at the Economics Faculty of VŠB in Ostrava(1992). He worked his way up to the position of manager of vehicle production at factory T613 in Příbor. He remained with Tatra until 1995 when the Czech Industrial Union Institute invited him to establish an affiliated branch in Moravia, which he led for the next five years. In 2000 he set up his own consultancy and educational firm HMPARTNERS, Ltd. of which he remains director. At the age of thirteen, he first came into con-

tact with the then illegal Scout movement, a movement whose aspirations have accompanied him ever since. From 1999- 2010 he led the Scout Centre in Kopřivnice. At the Jamboree2007 in London, he was officially appointed a successor to the World Scout Movement's founder, Lord Baden- Powell, and King Karl Gustav the XVI received him into the World Scout Foundation. In April 2010 at the Ivančena monument, he received from Josef Výprachtický, Junák'schief, a silver Saint George Medal as an award for his educative work for the Scout movement. In 1994 he became a member of the Rotary Club in Ostrava, and was its president from 2004 to 2005. His fondness for working with young people, has led him to promote connections between the Scout and Rotary movements on both

the district and international level and his activity has already been fruitful. The best example is the ratification of the official contract on cooperation between Junák and Rotary in the Czech Republic and also Slovakia. The next is the establishing of the Scout Centre VANAIVAN in Kopřivnice. By profession he is a trainer, coach and consultant in the sphere of management, and also a European patent attorney. He is vice president of human resources for the Moravia-Silesian Automobile Association and president of the Czech Alumni Japanese Association for Overseas Technical Scholarships (AOTS). We are very pleased to welcome Zdenek to this new position.

IFSR Interamerican Regional Meeting In San Diego PDG Richard Thorn Elected to serve as the Interamerican Region Chair

IFSR Annual General Meeting in Seoul 30 May 2016

The Annual General Meeting of IFSR took place today in Room 209-B of the Kintex I center in Seoul, presided over by IFSR International Commissioner Brian D. Thiessen at the request of President Harold Friend.

Members introduced themselves, including several new members who had joined IFSR at the Convention. Those attending were Bev Poor (D-9465), Doug McDonald (DGN D 5190), Phil Fleming (D-6460), Mark Ortiz (D-3850), Peter Pang (D-3450), Panayiotis Katrougalos (D-2470), Carolyn Thiessen (D-5160), Erik McGuire (D-6040), Kevin Button (D-5330), Debbie High (D-5930), Hajima Sakakibora (D-2760), Alan Thomson (D-9465), Alfredo Montes Nino (D-2201), Ross McConnell (Australia/New Zealand Chair from D-9710), Michael High (D-5930).

Invocation was given by Erik McGuire.

The Treasurer's Report that had been provided by IFSR Treasurer Ralph Winter was discussed and then approved by the members.

The Exhibit Booth report indicated that at that point we had about 17 new members and renewals [up to 24 by the end of the Convention] Members who helped in the Booth included Doug McDonald, Ross McConnell, Wayne Beaumier, Bev Poor, Alan Thomson, and Carolyn Thiessen.

The new Community Service Award and the Youth Service Award were explained so members can use them - information in detail is on the IFSR Web site.

Members were urged to send articles and pictures about their activities with Scouting to our webmaster and newsletter editor.

The upcoming world Scouting and Rotary events schedule was discussed and members were urged to volunteer to set up a booth to recruit new members.

Wayne Beaumier volunteered to help set up and staff a booth at the Interamerican Scout Region meeting in Houston 24-29 October as well as Lone Star PETS but this is the same weekend as Zone 21b & 27 in Salt Lake City - so he needs help on this.



Alfredo M. Nontes Nino of Madrid volunteered to do so at Zones 11,12, 13, 14, 17 and 18 Institute in Madrid in 23 -27 November.

Others indicted they would help at District Conferences or Zone Institutes near them.

Election process and organization of IFSR by the 6 WOSM Regions (50 members minimum) and country Sections (25 members) was discussed and the qualifications for leadership positions as outlined in the IFSR Constitution (available on the web site www.ifsr-net.org). Apologies for their inability to attend were relayed from Harold Friend and Mark Kriebel who were at the BSA National Annual Meeting in San Diego.

Charles Dahlquist is the new BSA National Commissioner



Charles Dahlquist assumed the psition of BSA National Commissioner in May of 2016. He is a Cliff Dochterman Award recipient, past chair of the BSA National Court of Honor, and introduced Chief Scout Executive Wayne Brock at the IFSR meeting at the 2013 BSA National Jamboree.

Charles Winston Dahlquist II is a leader in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS Church) and the Boy Scouts of America (BSA). Charles Dahlquist was born in Provo, Utah, and raised in Boise, Idaho. He received his juris doctorate from the University of Utah after finishing a bachelor's degree at Brigham Young University. He is an attorney and leader in civic and community organizations. Charles

is currently a member of the National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America. Most recently, he has served as BSA contingent chair for the 2015 World Scout Jamboree in Yamaguchi, Japan, chair of the National Venturing Task Force, and chair of the BSA National Court of Honor. He has also served as a Scoutmaster, Venturing Advisor, troop committee chair, president of the Great Salt Lake Council, member of the National Executive and Western Region boards, head chaplain for the centennial national Scout jamboree in 2010, and chair of the Faith and Beliefs area at the 2011 World Scout Jamboree in Sweden and the 2013 National Scout Jamboree. He is past president of the Rotary Club of Salt Lake City, and currently serves on the board of directors of Hale Center Theater, American Cancer Society, and Junior Achievement of Utah, as well as on the National President's Advisory Board of Utah Valley University and the board of American Friends of Bucerius Law School in Hamburg, Germany

Dahlquist has been involved in Scouting most of his life and has received the Silver Beaver Award (1988), the Silver Antelope Award (2007), the National Venturing Award (2008), and the Silver Buffalo Award (2008).

He served as a mission president for the LDS Church in the Germany Hamburg Mission. Charles was the honorary consul for Germany in Utah from 1999 to 2015 and received the Award of Merit, Second Class (2003) and the Award of Merit, First Class (2015) from the president of Germany for his service to Germany and in strengthening its relationship with the United States.

In a recent interview, Dahlquist stated: "Look at Scouting today. Its program, its leadership training (for youth and adults), its youth protection effort, its merit badge/personal growth program, and its newly revised Venturing program are more relevant to the needs of today's youth than ever before. It is just up to us to make it work, to get trained and work the program. Just take a moment to look at the program aspects of Scouting—in all families of Scouting. I personally have yet to see a better program for building youth who are prepared to face the challenges of the future than Scouting."

Scouting in Botswana:



The membership badge features a lion's head, a symbol in use since Botswana was a colonial branch of British Scouting. Scouting was established in 1936 and has the following sections: Cub Scouts 6-11 years, Junior Scouts 12-15 years, Senior Scouts 16-18 years, and Rover Scouts 19-25 years.

Scouts in Botswana grow up learning the outdoor skills from their parents and family. They use skills such as fire building and cooking, finding the direction of travel by use of the sun and stars, knots, pioneering, first aid and more, in everyday life.

Scout groups meet in local schools or in the outdoors in villages. Scouts have been involved in the self-help projects and other rural activities. Some of these long-term projects are poultry farming, beekeeping, wood and metalworking, and fruit and vegetable production.

Scouts often take long, adventurous trips into the bush. Their trips require much care, as there are numerous dangerous animals such as elephants and lions.

Adult male leadership is difficult in Botswana, as adult males do not associate themselves with children until they reach the age of 14. As a result of this, most leaders are women, teachers and clergymen.

Many Scout troops have their own vegetable gardens and are taught how

In the early 1990's, several Rotarians who were also Scouters met and discussed how to provide an outlet for other Rotarians who shared their same interest through a Rotary Fellowship.

A group of British Rotarians, interested in Scouting, formed the basis of the International Fellowship of Scouting Rotarians (IFSR). An organizing meeting was held at the RI Convention in Mexico City in 1991. The necessary requirements of creating a Rotary Fellowship were met and the fellowship was approved. The first formal meeting was held in Marselles, France. The fellowship today has over 1000 members worldwide and promotes the Rotary Motto of Service Above Self.

IFSR is a group of Rotarians dedicated to promoting the Scouting Movement internationally. We aim to develop a strong international network of Rotarians and those who have a passion for Scouting. IFSR provides opportunities for social and fellowship interaction among IFSR members. We also give active encouragement to Scouting at local, national and international levels and recognize individuals who have provided exceptionally unique service to Scouting and Rotary.

We are committed to supporting the youth in their physical, mental and spiritual development through a strong focus on the outdoors and survival skills. We encourage youth service and honor Rotary Clubs who provide service to or with Scout or Guide Units with the IFSR Youth Service Award. Below are some recent recipients of this award:

- Seniors were in for a special treat when young ladies from the Girl Guides, Brownies and Rainbows spent the evening with them at the Cayman Brac Rotary Club's annual Senior Citizen Dinner. Seniors were treated to a traditional Caymanian Christmas dinner and each given a gift prepared by the Rotarians.
- The Diamantina Scouts lost their Scout Hall when the building was targeted by arsonists in 2010. Through sausage sizzles and badge sales, the group raised more than USD \$20,000. With the support of the Rotary Club of Belconnen, the Scouts ACT branch raised the remaining USD \$130,000 needed to rebuild.
- The Brentwood Noon Rotary Club of Tennessee held its 11th Annual Little Harpeth River Cleanup, cleaning up more than 2,850 pounds of trash in a river that runs more than 10 miles through the city. In addition to Rotary Club members, volunteers from Boy Scout Troops and Cub Scout Packs helped.
- Thanks to a generous donation from the Rotary Club of Sherborne Castles, 21 members of the 1st Sherborne Girl Guides in Sherborne (England) will take part in a camping trip.

IFSR Youth Service Awards First Quarter 2016

In June 2015, the IFSR started The IFSR Youth Service Awards which are awarded to Rotary Clubs that renders service in support of Scout and/or Guide units which is publicized in the media. The following is a synopsis of the IFSR Youth Service Award recipients in the 1st quarter of 2016.

Brentwood Noon Rotary Club (TN), February 3, 2016, Brentwood Home Page: The Brentwood Noon Rotary Club held its 11th annual Little Harpeth River cleanup to clean up 10 miles through the city, removing more than 2,850 pounds of trash. Volunteers from Boy Scout Troops 8, 86, 93 and 747 helped, as well as Cub Scout Packs 6, 136, 223, 290 and 419.

Calhoun Rotary Club (GA), March 24, 2016, Calhoun Times: As part of the Calhoun Rotary Club's Scouting Outreach Program, the club hosted Audie Murphy, Scoutmaster of Troop 39, and Adam Hill, Cubmaster of Pack 39. They also help The Boys & Girls Clubs, Interact Clubs, and Rotakids Clubs.

Cohasset Rotary Club (MA), March 29, 2016, Cohasset Mariner and Patriot Ledger: Cohasset Rotary 10K Road Race by the Sea that is turning 40 this year. It supports many organizations including the Boy Scouts. Many Eagle Scout projects receive Rotary Club support. The Boy Scouts are one of the biggest groups that help keep the race running.
